Legislative Process

Second-year students in the *part-time Day Division* should register for one of the sections of Legislative Process listed on the first-year Day Division schedule (see previous page).

Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4

Day Division students are required to take Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4 during their second year. *Legal Writing 3* provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. *Legal Writing 4* focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. All second-year Day Division students were required to take Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, except for those who took a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (e.g., certain Law Review students). Students who took an Equivalency Class in the Fall, and deferred Legal Writing 3, must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Spring semester. All other second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 4 in the Spring semester.

INTENSIVE I.P. TRIAL ADVOCACY (3 credits)
