Legal Writing 3

Second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, unless you qualify to take a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (see below). Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. In the Spring semester, you will take Legal Writing 4, which focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. Note: Additional sections of Legal Writing 3 are listed on the Evening Division schedule.

EVIDENCE AND THE ART OF ADVOCACY / TRIAL ADVOCACY 1

This course will consist of taking Evidence and the Art of Advocacy (a special section of the basic Evidence course) and Trial Advocacy 1 during the same semester. You will receive a total of six credits and will receive one grade for the entire six credits. Pass/fail is not available. If you have already taken Evidence, you may not take this course. **Students should register for both Evidence and the Art of Advocacy and the Trial Advocacy 1 section listed below.** The course is designed for students who have a serious interest in litigation and wish to be trial lawyers. The goal is to give students a mastery of the rules of evidence while also learning the practical application of those rules in the courtroom. You will be applying the rules of evidence as they are discussed each week in class in your Trial Advocacy sections that same week. The Evidence class will be taught by Justice Erickson, and the Trial Advocacy 1 sections will be taught by experienced trial lawyers. The course will be limited to twenty-four students for the Evidence portion; students will be assigned, in groups of eight, to one of the Trial Advocacy sections. There will be an Evidence final, a midterm bench trial, and a final jury trial.
