The organization provides a wide variety of ongoing programs and support services to a growing network of college professors who want to expand opportunities for their students to learn about American history, government, and political thought. Today there are nearly 500 JMC faculty partners on 179 college campuses across the country, including Notre Dame and partner programs in the Chicago area.
